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Dear Friends in Christ,

At a recent gathering of retired pastors, I asked participants to share the names of their home congregations. After all the introductions, I noticed that every congregation named was one I would love to attend—where the Gospel is proclaimed and the community is real.

Nothing gratifies a bishop more than seeing the vibrancy of the synod's congregations. Our most important goal as a synod staff is to support and nurture life-giving communities of faith. And, yet, we all know that a healthy congregation doesn't just magically appear; it is a miraculous coming together of gifts, talents, leaders, love, and openness to the spirit. When a synod is filled with such communities, our joy is clear, our gratitude is deep. Thank you for being communities where lives are healed and transformed through the Gospel shared in Word, Sacrament, and beloved community.

In addition to our 147 congregations, the synod has three new mission starts: Tapestry in Richfield, Intertwine in Northeast Minneapolis, Tree of Life in the North Loop. We have 268 pastors and deacons serving congregations (including 10 whom I was privileged to ordain in 2016), 71 serving in specialized ministries such as chaplaincy, and 326 who are now retired and rostered in our synod.

Much of the synod's work focuses on *leaders*. We actively look for faithful pastors and deacons to serve in our synod. We *support* leaders through mentoring, peer groups, theological and spiritual growth. We provide resources for elected congregational leaders, especially through our staff's commitment to offer wise and swift responses to the many resource requests we receive each day.

The members of our synod staff spend much of their time in congregations—preaching, installing new pastors and deacons, and providing leadership in times of transition: staff changes, call processes (of which our synod had 34 in 2016), conflict situations, and strategic planning. We also foster *connections* among ministries and congregations, believing we are stronger together. Our relationships with our companion synods continue to flourish. Next month I travel to Nigeria for the installation of the new Archbishop of the Lutheran Church of Christ in Nigeria, the Rev. Musa Filibus. In May, I will be in Leipzig for Germany's premiere observance of the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation.

We also have a distinctive focus on worship. We both host and provide funding for the Center for Worship and Music, led by Jay Beech, which "fosters imagination and creativity to make worship innovative and meaningful in every time and culture." I invite you to its website: worshipandmusic.org.

Our commitment to the care of creation grows – and we delight in the efforts of our synod's EcoFaith Network. Together, we worked to pass a resolution at the 2016 ELCA Churchwide Assembly that will provide resources so every congregation knows the watershed district in which it is located.

At our 2016 synod assembly, we passed a resolution asking each congregation to develop a mission statement on racial justice and appoint a person to serve as racial justice liaison with the synod.

During that same assembly we approved a synodical capital campaign feasibility study in conjunction with the ELCA churchwide campaign. Depending upon the study results, your synod council will decide whether to launch a campaign. The focus will be on raising resources for those urgent mission priorities that we can only do as church together.

We struggled some financially in FY 2015-16, receiving only 94% of our anticipated mission support from congregations. This meant that churchwide received 94% of what our synod pledged – and the synod operated on 94% of budget. We are especially grateful to all who have faithfully supported the synod and churchwide through their benevolence for FY 2016-17.

Thank you for the incredible privilege of serving as your bishop. I have such a deep sense of calling to this work, such profound gratitude for the Minneapolis Area Synod, and such love for the Gospel-centered, thoughtful, and welcoming work we do as the ELCA. Please let us know how we can serve one another better – working together so all experience gracious invitation into life-giving Christian community and live in just and healthy neighborhoods.

People of Our Father's,

In this first month of the new year I find myself thankful to God for all God's provision and blessing of the past year, particularly the ways we have grown together in deeper trust and mutuality. I am thankful for the pages of this Annual Report which tell the story of our life and plans together.

This is a time of great challenge—and great opportunity. God's purpose for us guiding us: *Living Christ's Love*, we *Invite all to Worship*, *Learn*, *Disciple and Serve*. Our life together is one of increasing growth and commitment as we practice and experiment to learn who we are and how we will be. Thanks be to God for equipping us and entrusting God's ministry to us.

I pray in the weeks and months to come our becoming will continue; that we will continue to make relationship with God and one another (*Love God, love people*) the most important thing. I pray for a heart and spirit of forgiveness and a commitment to reconciliation which will keep us together in unity.

In the time after Christ's ascension, the early church was confronted with challenges not unlike those of today: cities were filled with people of different languages and beliefs living and working together. The Apostle Paul writes to the church in Ephesus to direct and encourage them by sharing the truth in love and offering guidance on the Christian life.

Chapter four of Paul's letter to the Ephesians is entitled, *Unity in the Body of Christ*. The Message calls it *To Be Mature*. Paul proposes that in grace the Spirit shares gifts with each of us, "But each of us was given grace according to the measure of Christ's gift (v. 7)." Those gifts, combined together in love and service to God, serve to connect us and connect others as the family of Christ.

Paul continues, "The gifts he gave were that some would be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers, to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ...(vs.11-12)."

This is a great image of the purpose we share as the body of Christ (the church): to equip the saints for the work of ministry. The work of ministry is the work of connecting: to God and to others. When we live with intentionality with this we become people of the Great Commission, Christ's appointed purpose to go out to all nations baptizing and sharing everything he taught and trusting in his promise to be with us to the end of the age.

In his Letter to Ephesians, Paul centers this all in unifying love and spiritually maturing growth: "...until all of us come to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to maturity, to the measure of the full stature of Christ. We must no longer be children, tossed to and fro and blown about by every wind of doctrine, by people's trickery, by their craftiness in deceitful scheming. But speaking the truth in love, we must grow up in every way into him who is

the head, into Christ, from whom the whole body, joined and knit together by every ligament with which it is equipped, as each part is working properly, promotes the body's growth in building itself up in love (Ephesians 4:13-16)."

Paul is proposing a connected way of living in unity so that we have vitality in our relationships with God and with each other. We have been learning and growing, patiently waiting for God's direction to move forward at the appointed time. It appears to be the appointed time.

God has been niggling at our hearts in various ways that help us feel a renewed sense of purpose and optimism. Let us make 2018 a year of focus on emerging unity and love in which we all step forward in unifying love, purpose and divine action.

How does this action look? It always begins with prayer and listening. Together we are partners in Christ's Community and partners actively invite others to share and experience God's joy. We do this by committing to and growing in faith practices:

- PRAY daily
- WORSHIP regularly
- **GROW** in wisdom and understanding of God's Word and will for our lives and in our participation and commitment to relationships of accountability
- SHARE our financial resources in gratitude for all that God has first given to us
- GIVE of our time, gifts and abilities for the sake of God's kingdom on earth
- and **TELL** others about the God whom we confess

I invite you to join us into the new thing God is and has been doing in our midst. We are becoming new again, "See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it? (Isaiah 43:19a)."

God loves you and so do I! Pastor Jon Blessings to you and Happy 2018!!!

It always blows my mind how fast time can pass. Many amazing things can happen in such short time, but then there are also amazing things that come to fruition over a long period of time. Whether the transformation time be short or long, in most cases it is not in our timeline, but God's.

In 2017 we have had many amazing blessings bubble up within our community and beyond, and since it is often easy to miss some of these amazing gifts, I would like to take pause and reflect upon a few of them and put them up along side our statement of purpose:

"Living Christ's Love, we invite all to: Worship, Learn, Disciple, and Serve"

Worship

Bells, Choir, Family Friendly Service...where to begin? We have so many unique blessings, but one of the newest additions to our worship service is the use of Facebook Live. For those of you not familiar with it, it is real-time video streaming on Facebook, and after the live feed is over, the recording can be kept available for future viewing. There is no replacing the importance and many benefits of being present in worship, but this is one amazing way to serve those who cannot make it to service...and the response from those who have used it has been great! Just to give you an idea of the outreach, over our last two Christmas Cantatas, we have had a combined total of over 1,700 views!!!

Learn

One of the most exciting and energy filled places at OFLC is on Wednesday evenings during Confirmation. There is an unexplainable energy, connectedness, and relational vitality that most faith communities yearn for. Worship services are primarily student lead and offer new perspectives on how being church looks. One of the noticings I have had is how many new leaders have stepped forward to engage with and mentor the youth! I would invite you to consider serving in this space if you are looking for a rewarding service opportunity...just ask one of the Confirmation leaders!

Disciple

When people think of disciples, most think of Jesus's crew, the twelve. In actuality, we are all called to be and make disciples – Matthew 28:19 in the great commission. There is one unique example of this that happens in schools all across the country, and Rockford is no exception. The program is called STRIVE...and what it stands for is Students Taking Renewed Interest in the Value of Education. What it is in actuality is a mentorship program for kids in high school that are at the lower half of their class grade wise, and they are presented with the opportunity to enroll in a

STRIVE program to work toward bettering their future. What happens in STRIVE is there are Mentors from the community, many from OFLC, that take time out of their day twice a month to meet with students and provide mentorship. Relationships are cultivated, trust is gained, conversations had, and life altering directional changes are produced for both the student and mentors alike as they grow and discover what they are passionate about or called to do...college, vocational training, trade schooling, entrepreneur, etc.

Serve

Serving others is one of the most selfless acts one can do. As it is said in Hebrews 13:1-2, "Keep on loving one another as brothers and sisters. Do not forget to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing so some people have shown hospitality to angels without knowing it." When thinking of being God's hands and feet, and reflecting on this scripture, I cannot help but think of one amazing example of one of our own showing Christ's love in the world be being a good Samaritan. This story is a profound witness of what happens when you are paying attention and are letting God lead. Long story short, the Samaritan had to get fuel for his vehicle and came across a couple who were broke down in many ways (physically, mentally, emotionally, and financially) after just being duped into purchasing what they felt was a good vehicle. The Samaritan left, but then felt a spiritual press to return to offer help. Not only did he help the couple get vehicle maintenance, but he helped to break down cultural and racial stigmas; he has helped to opened up their eyes to God's abundant grace; has allowed our faith community to enter into relationship with them through prayers and financial support; but furthermore, he has continued to nurture that relationship and offer spiritual mentorship...all because he stopped to lend a helping hand. This was not the Samaritan's doing, this was God's doing...he was just the messenger.

Call to Action 2018.

I know I am not the only one who feels a sense we need to move. We have had several years of pruning, visioning, and now the atmosphere feels primed to do something about it. Some may ask why now? I say why not?

I personally have felt a spiritual press about this, and I know others have too, and we can even see signs of it within our community. The was even a small group that gathered together to discuss what a future church might look like? And you know what we found out? We are already there...we just need more momentum to do God's great ministry.

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Part of the vision for in 2018 is to identify a few things to focus on doing, and do them well. Solidification of our focus for 2018 will happen early on in the year with the new leadership team, but here are just a few of the items for consideration:

- How can we better support our youth after confirmation?
- People actively desire a place to serve...how might we better connect them with service opportunities?
- Formalize a framework to better suit how we do church today
- A comprehensive building review for current and future needs is required, and development of an action plan for execution in 2019 will have to be flushed out.
- Renewed focus on Year Round Stewardship
- Constitutional review and rework
- How can we better equip people for leadership opportunities?

Friends, 2017 was a great year, but 2018 has countless opportunities for use to explore and put forth into action! We have been blessed beyond measure and now just need to prayerfully consider how we get to share that with the world around us and be Christ's hands and feet.

I really hope this is obvious to you, but the kingdom of God is here and now. This life we have is a precious gift, and we only have one life to live here on earth. There are no "do-overs," "time outs," "mulligans," or "false starts." This is the main event, this is the Super Bowl, the Finals, this is it! Make it count.

God created you for greatness, he made you awesome, he made you in his image, and who are we to argue that? Be the person he created you to be. Be awesome! Be the one who loves on the unlovable, the one who everyone can count on, can lean on. Be the change agent, the difference maker, the miracle in someone's life. Remember to love others just as Christ loves you.

I'm not sure about you, but at the end of my life, I would like God to be able to say to me, "Well done, my good and faithful servant, well done!"

Remember, God loves you all and so do I!

Education: Engage & Confirm 2017-2018

We have an awesome group of students on Wednesday nights for Engage & Confirm. We registered 75 students in September – a large group! We have many students who are busy in school activities and community groups but they still show up as often as possible to be with each other and discuss being Christians in today's world. Twelve students completed their Affirmation of Faith on October 29, 2017.

Our curriculum this year comes from a combination of three different lesson plans.

- Reform lessons are used to discuss the big questions on parent's night such as "Can I be a Christian without going to church?" and "Why does the bible contradict itself?"
- Collaborate lessons are used on regular lesson nights. Using videos, games and discussion time, we have discussed subjects such as The Apostle's Creed and The Book of Acts.

Our regular schedule is:

- Supper at 6:00pm
- Large group at 6:30pm
- Small group at 7:00pm
- Worship at 7:30pm

Our worship time is a student lead service with Pr. Jon or another adult leading the message. Helping students understand how important they are to the church is an important part of their faith journey.

The annual gathering takes place in October. In 2017, we had no attendees from OFLC. Previous presentations led to donations from Women's Ministry for women in need. Part of the attendees' fees are paid by Women's Ministry.

Women of the ELCA Thank-offering Sunday

This is an annual global event. The Women of OFLC led both services on Sunday, November 19. We collected donations totaling \$803 which were then donated to Women of the ELCA.

Lefse Making

With the work of many hands, the Lefse dough was prepared on November 17 and on November 18 we made 300 pieces of Lefse to sell at our annual cookie walk. The best part of this event is the fellowship and sharing of family history and tradition.

Cookie Walk & Silent Auction

On December 2, we held our 29th annual Cookie Walk/Silent Auction/Craft Sale. This is part of the day long "Crow River Christmas" community celebration. We had another successful event with people lining up an hour before the sale began. This was due to good advertising and the reputation this event has built over the years because of the many church and community members who donate baked cookies, silent auction items and time. We sold a new record of 109 sloppy joe lunches too! Proceeds from this event support OFLC ministries and the surrounding community. With some of the 2017 funds, we made donations towards the new commercial coffee maker for the kitchen and for OFLC youth to attend the National Youth Gathering. (Note: Jim and Barb Strehlow received a "Thrivent Action Team Grant" to support this project.)

Thanks to 20+ volunteers windows were washed, weed whipping and weeding accomplished. Above all, we joined together to become the body of Christ in serving our neighbor.

Harvest Festival 2017

The first annual Harvest Festival was held in early October. It featured great food, a bake sale, farmers' market, live music, hay rides, a pumpkin patch and pumpkin decorating. Local community groups set up informational booths to share their activities and stories. The festival raised nearly \$4000 that would go to support OFLC ministries. Best of all, however, we saw a gathering of our neighbors in celebration of the abundance of God's gifts in our lives. We look forward to growth in this event for 2018.

No Tricks, All Treats

What fun it was to host over 40 young ones for activities and goodies, a meal and a movie. Although there was no shortage of sugar that night, the children also went home with treat bags filled with Christian themed stickers and prizes to remind them that they are Jesus' light in the world. Thanks to a Thrivent grant, the event cost was covered and enough left over to support confirmation dinners.

Riverworks Partnership

There's a great opportunity for local volunteer work right in our community. The Riverworks Thrift Store receives mounds of good, usable items. Proceeds from the resale of these items goes to support the Riverworks Food Shelf and other Riverworks programming to strengthen our community. However, it takes lots of hands to sort, tag and hang, or display all of these donated items. And that's where we come in. The first and third Thursdays of each month we have a number of volunteers who meet at the store and assist with whatever is needed at the moment. We work under the direction of in-the-know staff, so it's easy to feel useful almost immediately. Join us for some active conversation and a chance to see how our donated items are used to benefit local and not-so-local (think Haiti) individuals.

OFLC has committed to staffing the Riverworks Food Shelf on the 5th Monday of the month. While this does not occur regularly, it does happen several times per year. With just a little training it's easy to assist shoppers as they navigate aisles and choose from the canned goods, fresh produce, baked good, and dairy cases. If you have a few hours on an occasional Monday evening it's a great way to become involved in the community. Our Thanksgiving time program, **Dimes for Discipleship**, led by the OFLC youth, raised \$900. These monies were donated to the food shelf and designated for the purchase of turkeys for the holidays.

Seminarian Report

Living Christ's Love - Grateful, Thankful and Hopeful

In 2017, I am grateful for the continued support of the OFLC community as I completed my second year of seminary studies at Luther Seminary. I am thankful that this Spirit-led community provides space for those who wish to explore their call into ministry. The proposed General Fund budget for 2017 is \$297,100.00 This is a 1% increase from the 2016 budget. Some of the highlights of the proposed budget include: Compensation and Benefits: includes adhering to the Minneapolis ELCA Synod Compensation Guidelines, covering health care benefit rate increases, and a full year budget for the new Learning and Community Advocate position. This position brought forward four potential applicants and follow-up interviews have been conducted. The hope is to fill the position sooner rather than later. Benevolence: Includes allocation of \$3000 to the General Scholarship Fund and contributions to the Minneapolis ELCA Synod (5% of total General Fund income collected) and Rockford Riverworks (1% of total General Fund income collected). If a check is made out specifically for Riverworks, this is not included in the 1% of	

- total income collected; a separate check is issued to Riverworks for any donations made specifically to them.
- Worship: includes worship supplies, new music scores, additional music performances, and cost of musicians
- Ministry Support: This is a new component of the proposed budget this year to provide start-up funds for organic ministries.
- o **Buildings And Grounds:** OFLC can access the Line Of Credit for any major capital improvement needed (i.e. new furnace, air conditioner). Council would be required to approve any expenditure from the Line Of Credit. The congregation would need to approve any expenditure over \$5,000.
- Other important points:
 - Typically, the church does not spent the entire proposed budget each year.
 - Since OFLC operates on a faith based budget, the budget is fluid and adjustments can be made throughout the year.
 - The OFLC leadership has attempted to be good stewards of the financial resources of the community.
 - There are other possibilities OFLC can utilize to maximize income generated (i.e. the use of phone text giving, fundraising, building/land use to generate revenue, outside resources such as Amazon Smile and Thrivent, and grant money).
 - The second mortgage declining line of credit that was taken out in 2012 will be paid off in April 2017. It is approximately \$500/month.
 - Approximately 40 of the 180 giving units utilize Simply Giving. There is a monthly fee associated with Simply Giving of approximately \$40/month.



These reflections will sound a lot like a synopsis of Brian's past year. Why? Because they are. My hope is you'll hear the gifts you shared. Please also listen as our statement of purpose is lived out: Worship, Learn, Disciple & Serve

As Marie and I entered 2017, it was a fresh year to connect with each other as the previous year had both of our children moving out on their own. It was just the two of us again, just as it started out so many years ago.

There was the fact that at the beginning of 2017, many life events were happening: I decided to leave church council, which for me was a big decision but felt it was right. I could spend the time with Marie and listen for what God was calling me into next. There was also the fact my brother (Jim) in Pennsylvania was in the last months of his life battling stage-four lung cancer. This is the first place God called me into.

Through my sister, I found out my brother was okay with having a funeral service, but only if I did it. In my brother's words, "He's the churchy one in the family." My brother wouldn't discuss anything about the service, so I was left to figure this out on my own. So I reached out to Pastor Jon on the "how," and all of you for prayers of strength and guidance. We lifted my brother up in worship, Pastor Jon taught, I learned, I continued being a disciple and served my family when they needed these gifts most. Okay, with lots of help from Marie doing the service pamphlets, thank you notes and love! Wow, God, that was a real big call, but thank you, God, for giving Jim & I the time to heal wounds and provide grace for each other until we meet again.

The next two months went by just fine as we did our best to support each other like families do. Spring break was approaching for Marie, and we decided not to go back to Pennsylvania this year and just use the time to relax at home and maybe get a project done or a book or two read; after all, it was Spring Break. It was during this time Marie also found out she had a tumor slightly larger then a baby's head in her abdomen. Now what? Since I'm no physician, I went to the only place I could go-- I went to God and my family of deep spirited friends. Marie and I quickly became comfortable with the surgeon, and together made the decision to remove the tumor as we felt it was part of the pain Marie had been experiencing for a while. Just a few days after surgery, Marie left this Kingdom and was welcomed home to her eternal life with our Savior. I share this part of the story so you can hear in the next part how the Kingdom is here and now for us as well as then for Marie and all those who believe.

I'm now going to share some reflections specifically from the first weeks of grief when I lost my best friend. None of this is to lift any one person up, or myself--it is to be a witness of how Jesus walks with us in this Kingdom all the time.

In the panic of the day, I naturally called my daughters, but the next call was to my Pastor who was not in the area, but he sent the closest disciple for immediate support. This helped to keep me grounded in the Lord. Then, disciple after disciple kept showing up to make sure we were okay and to make sure we wouldn't have to cook for the next week or two. Love God, Love Neighbor. I had no clue what to do the next morning, as it was Sunday, so I got up and went to worship knowing full well it could be viewed as crazy. But for me, it was where I needed to be. You see, I talked to God when this all started, and in my prayer, I told Him I would love Him no less no matter the outcome, because I know His love for me never changes. So I was going to do my human best to love Him, too.

Out of death comes resurrection, and one of those stories (there were many) happened during the long wait during Marie's wake. When one particular person reached me, they told me about how they were standing next to someone they had had a disagreement with for many years, but during the waiting, that fact was lifted up, grace moved in and healing began. Stories like this went on for hours and I have one of my own.

Marie's surgeon had called earlier in the week, and I had told her that I release her from any guilt she may be feeling as she used her God-given gifts to the best of her ability. Well, she showed up that night, and I remember placing my hands on each of her cheeks looking into her eyes and telling her how Marie and I trusted her so much and she needs to accept the gift of grace or she can't do what God called her to do. I could feel the weight leave the space as I told her God Loves her and so do I. That, my friends, is the Holy Spirit at work.

At the end of the night, my nephew--who came in from Oregon--said, "Uncle Brian, I don't understand, you and the girls stood there for hours as so many came in distraught and crying, yet after they left you, it was as though *they* were healed a little from the hurt and were even laughing not crying. Aren't they supposed to help *you* heal and support *you*?" It was then I think I somehow figured it out, and I told him that grief is an ugly personal mess with no two people reacting or feeling the same, but the healing from grief can only be done in community with others. I am so blessed to have a community who loves me like you all do. Worship, Learn, Disciple & Serve.

In July, the girls and I went back to see our family in Pennsylvania, and when we left as I said goodbye to my sister Patty, I felt as though something was wrong. It was just a week or so later she ended up in the hospital, and it was then she was told her cancer had spread throughout her body and there was nothing they could do. On July 31,she joined her brother and Marie in their eternal life together. My sister had gone church shopping in her area, but never settled into one. I called several asking them to do the service, and only one had the courage to tell me "no," and the rest never even responded. This says a lot about our OFLC community and how we listen to what God has called us to do. I've never heard of turning away from a relationship

request. That being said, God called me into doing yet another celebration of life service for a sibling. Again you entered in with me and didn't leave me alone. We prayed over more palm crosses, and more were sent. Worship, Learn, Disciple & Serve.

Okay, God, I did leave space for you to call me into something new, but my something was way different than what you called me to. *Just wait keep listening*. So the next time God called, I started out with a resounding "no." I thought of at least five excuses why I shouldn't help the stranded motorist at the Holiday Station. But the press was strong, so after leaving, I returned and entered into the request from God. As many of you know, LD and Keyona had just bought a vehicle, and it broke down right away. Immediately, I called those in the community I thought could help that night. The next week, we found out the issue wasn't a small one, so I reached out to the entire community of OFLC hoping for prayer as we tried to solve the issue. You all stepped in in a radical way showing Christ's love. Love God, Love Neighbor.

Jesus never promised a life of ease just because we decided to follow Him. If fact, He says in Luke 9:23, "Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross daily and follow me." This is so important it's in Matthew 16:24, also. Take up your cross; "What, a cross? That is an instrument of death during Jesus' time!" Yes, your cross. You must die to the old self to be born to whom God made you to be. Just like baptism. Oh yeah, and it's not a "one and done;" it's daily my friends, daily. Without the death to myself, I would have no hope of seeing Marie again, but that is not the case. I'm full of hope. It doesn't mean I don't hurt some days. Okay, lots of days.

Before closing these reflections on 2017, I would like to share a few thoughts/phrases with you.

No mistake is bigger than Jesus (so bring it to Him)

Hope = Confident Expectation

Come and Die (you're invited in to be forgiven daily and start new each day, heck every minute)

Never forget: God Loves You and So Do I


